Proposed Rate Increase

Proposed increases in monthly water-and-sewer fees -- 5.5% annually for sewer and 2.5% for water -- could pay for immediate, necessary water-treatment upgrades over the next five years, a water-resources analyst told the Independence City Council Tuesday night.

The \$9.7 million price tag for the full project – which would include a membrane bioreactor filtration system – won't be part of the first phase. Instead, some of the requirements for water-quality maintenance in Independence will be undertaken during an initial 5-year period. These first-phase steps will allow the city to address some of the regulations imposed by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality, explained Steve Donovan, the municipal-water expert hired by the city.

Like other cities, Independence's water-sewer fees can be expected to rise on "the rate escalator" for the foreseeable future, Mr. Donovan said. If adopted, the increases would mean that a fairly typical wastewater bill would increase from about \$46 in 2018 to \$57 in 2022 and, over the same period, the bill for water would rise from \$63.80 to \$70.43. Some of the current billing services city debt, too. About \$6.50 of an average bill goes to pay debt on the Independence Civic Center, which replaced the former city hall; About \$14.50 goes to pay debt from MINET, the broadband company co-founded by the city with Monmouth, Mr. Donovan noted. The monthly billing also includes franchise charges, which are fees paid to the city for the use of the public right-of-way to deliver services.

The proposed rate schedule currently is under review. No action on it was taken by councilors.

Building Fees Increase

The expense of reviewing applications and plans for new construction doesn't cover current staff costs, necessitating a 7.5% increase in these fees, according to Independence Finance Director Gloria Butsch, who reported on the shortfall to councilors Tuesday night.

Technically called the "land use fee schedule," the fees that are currently collected for land development within the city simply don't cover the staff time associated with processing, Ms. Butsch explained. A resolution to approve the percentage increase was approved by the city council.
